I am pleased to present this report to you on the achievements of the State Use Program for Fiscal Year 2008 and its positive impact on the lives of our citizens with disabilities.

In Fiscal Year 2008, the State Use Program accounted for more than \$29 million in contracts between Community Rehabilitation Facilities and State agencies for products and services. The program helped provide training, employment and greater independence for 2,544 disabled individuals and supplied them with 777,516 hours of work.

With continued support of this program, the number of disabled individuals with longterm employment and increased economic stability will grow, minimizing their need for public assistance and entitlement benefits.

The State Use Program is truly a win-win investment for the State of Illinois - providing job opportunities and greater independence for its disabled citizens while benefiting State agencies with quality goods and services at fair market prices.

The State Use Program



The State Use Program began in 1983 when the Illinois Purchasing Act was amended to allow the State to contract with qualified Community Rehabilitation Facilities (CRFs) without going through a competitive bidding process.

Community Rehabilitation Facilities, sometimes referred to as sheltered workshops, provide employment opportunities for severely disabled individuals, allowing them the opportunity to find meaningful employment and job training.

Through CMS, State agency procurement needs are matched to the capabilities of a CRF, providing long-term employment opportunities for those unable to engage in normal competitive employment.

All State of Illinois agencies participating in this program are assured of high quality products and services, on-time delivery, payment of fair market price and a central point of contact for assistance. All contracts are independently reviewed, evaluated and approved by the State Use Committee to ensure the best quality and pricing available.

The State Use Regional coordinators, along with the procurement experts in the Bureau of Strategic Sourcing and Procurement (BOSSAP), have worked directly with the CRFs to provide business opportunities for the disabled citizens of Illinois.

Today, the CRFs offer services ranging from janitorial, document shredding, microfilming, printing and data entry to rest area maintenance, carpet cleaning and laundry services. They also produce needed commodities such as soap, pillows, desk pad calendars, trash can liners, license plates and laser printer cartridges.



Bridgeway Training Services has a contract with the Department of Revenue opening and sorting the IL-1040 tax returns for the State of Illinois. This contract provided approximately 35 jobs for people with disabilities in FY 08.



Benefits of the Program

First and foremost, individuals with disabilities benefit from this program. They are afforded meaningful long-term employment opportunities, marketable job skills, and a greater chance for economic independence. In expanding their scope of experience and enhancing their abilities, some disabled employees are able to take on new assignments at increasingly higher levels of difficulty, which prepares them for a wider variety of jobs either within or outside of the Rehabilitation Facility. In Fiscal Year 2008, 61 Community Rehabilitation Facilities were awarded contracts with State agencies through the State Use Program, employing 2,544 disabled individuals.

The State of Illinois benefits by receiving high-quality goods and services for fair market prices in long-term contracts. With no competitive bidding process required for State Use contracts with qualified CRFs, the State experiences reduced administrative costs as well. In Fiscal Year 2008, the State awarded 265 such contracts.

Providing disabled citizens with opportunities for economic independence enables them to become taxpayers and reduces their need for public assistance and entitlements benefits.

The paper plate contract, through Shelby County Community Services, provides vocational training for persons with disabilities and helps them gain confidence while earning a wage. The paper plates are distributed to various agencies throughout Illinois.





The Chicago Lighthouse provides educational, clinical and vocational services to people who are blind or visually impaired. Through adaptive technology, which enables visually disabled persons to function effectively, The Chicago Lighthouse secured a web-based contract with The Department of Human Services processing Recipient Identification Numbers.

Community Rehabilitation Facilities (CRFs)



To qualify to participate in the State Use Program, a CRF must meet the following guidelines:

- Comply with Illinois law governing private not-for-profit organizations.
- Be certified as a sheltered workshop by the Wage and House Division of the U.S. Government.
- Meet the Illinois Department of Rehabilitation Services Just Standards for a rehabilitation facility.
- Have a completed Bidders Application on file with the Department of Central Management Services.
- Meet the bid specifications or the needs of the purchasing agency.
- Set a fair market price.
- Report quarterly of any contracts with State agencies.

In Fiscal Year 2008, there were 103 registered Community Rehabilitation Facilities in Illinois.

The State is divided in half into a Northern Region and a Southern Region. A regional coordinator represents each of the regions, providing assistance necessary to facilitate success of the program.

The State Use Committee

The State Use Committee was created to monitor the purchase of products and services from the Community Rehabilitation Facilities. The Committee consists of the Director of the Department of Central Management Services, the Secretary of the Department of Human Services, two representatives from private business, and two public members. The public and private members are appointed by the Governor and must be knowledgeable in the needs and concerns of rehabilitation facilities in Illinois.

The Committee meets at least quarterly to review proposed contracts, develop guidelines to be followed by qualified CRFs, and assist the State Use staff in the development of policy. Upon Committee approval, State agencies are given the authority to proceed with contracts that are exempt from the bidding process.

The Committee has the following responsibilities to ensure that it meets its annual objectives:

- Request information from State agencies regarding product specifications and service requirements necessary to meet their needs;
- Meet quarterly or more often, as necessary, to carry out the Committee's purpose;
- Request a quarterly report from each participating CRF, which describes the volume of sales of each product or service sold;
- Prepare a publication listing all the supplies and services available from qualified CRFs and distribute the list to all State Purchasing Officers; and
- Review all bids submitted under the provisions of the Act and reject any such bids for any purchase that is determined to be substantially more than the purchase would have cost had it been competitively bid.

The Committee's objective for the future is to encourage more State agencies to participate in the program and to match up more contracts for supplies and services with qualified workshops not currently doing business with the State.

The ultimate goal is to continue to increase the opportunities for gainful employment and economic independence for Illinois' disabled citizens.

Procurement Procedure



Any State agency wishing to establish a contract with a qualified Community Rehabilitation Facility must submit a request for approval to the Manager of the State Use Program. The request must include the name of the CRF, type of contract desired, duration of the contract, and the dollar amount. A Procurement Business Case (PBC) must be attached to the request. The PBC is a document that is established at the initial phase of all procurements. It outlines the details of the procurement and must be approved by the State Purchasing Officer at each respective agency. PBCs are instrumental in tracking the history and detail of procurements.

The CRF must provide a Certificate of Assurance that details how many clients will be working as a result of the contract. A narrative must also be included that outlines the specifics of the contract. These documents are then presented to the State Use Committee. Once the Committee has approved the contract, the agency is given the authority to proceed. All State Use contracts are exempt from the bidding process.





Employment Opportunities

The primary objective of the CMS State Use Program is to develop employment opportunities for citizens with disabilities by establishing contracts with CRPs for goods and services. There were 2,544 jobs created for citizens with disabilities through these State contracts during Fiscal Year 2008. An average of more than 2,400 jobs has been created in the past two fiscal years.




Client Hours Worked




State Use Contracts Awarded
